


Who Voted

Bottom Line Conclusions

In 2020, Texas Democrats in competitive races underperformed among unaligned voters, especially Anglos, by being portrayed as ideologically extreme and a risk versus a "reliable" Republican.

Incumbent Democrats had a larger Democratic base and a record of service to overcome attacks. Challengers running in harder districts had neither.

To win GOP-held seats or to compete statewide, Texas Democratic candidates must build a stronger and more reliable coalition that reflects mainstream values of Texas

Texas Values and Issues Research Project



Our goal: to understand how to best characterize and inoculate Democratic candidates and define Republicans in order to increase support from Anglo and other unaligned voters while not forfeiting crucial backing from core Democratic constituencies.



Questions to be answered

- 1. What are the perceived positive brands, values and overall image of Democrats that can be leveraged to grow support among Anglo and other unaligned voters?
- 2. Where are GOP fault lines that emphasize negative traits and perceptions that push unaligned voters away?
- 3. How do we best marry the positive feedback on Democrats with negative feedback on Republicans to improve our brand overall and to fit within a responsible issue battery?



Overview

The project will include three phases:

- 1. Statewide election analysis
- 2. Commercial-style market-approach focus groups

3. Partisan Sorting: A nontraditional polling process to explore attitudes and concerns of unaligned voters
